A message from the Principal

2019 saw some significant changes in our School as we forge forward as the premier school of the Midwest. The year started with much delight with our 2018 cohort having outstanding ATAR results, which

made Geraldton Grammar School the Top Country School in WA for 2018. There are approximately 150 high schools in WA and overall we were placed 28th, ahead of many Perth schools.

This year we had some unique school changes occur, to name a few:

- We introduced an Arts, Sports and Academic Captain into our Student Leadership team,
- we introduced HUBs and HUB Captains to invite student voice from across the school.
- we finally completed the long awaited basketball courts building one for primary and two for secondary,
- · the girls had trousers introduced into the uniform,
- we had our inaugural Arts Day,
- we introduced a new House Awards System where students can work towards earning a badge for their House in each of the three HUBS in Secondary,
- we had our first 3 week July school holiday,
- we extended the school day to allow more meaningful time for events that sit outside the curriculum, such as the Child Safe Curriculum, more worthwhile House activities and a Dalton period for years 7-10 which allows students to ask for help in an area of need,
- · more guest speakers were invited to assemblies,
- a sports period for years 11/12, which was not there in previous years and
- we attended our very first ACC Cross Country event in Perth.

This year also saw us increase our campus time for our Student Wellbeing Officer as we try to combat and prevent the increase in mental illness that is occurring across Australia in young people.

In terms of curriculum, we brought in the future-ready skills across the whole school so our students are better equipped to handle what lies ahead in a world that is rapidly changing and jobs as we knew them 10 years ago are disappearing. We focused on a different skill each term - critical thinking, creativity,



collaboration and communication. We introduced continuous feedback so that parents and students receive feedback on where the learners are in their learning, where they are going and how to get there. E-portfolios were introduced in the primary school through SEQTA for years 3-6 and SeeSaw for our early learning classes. As a school, we continued on our journey of making students assessment capable through teachers developing learning intentions and success criteria.

- The Debating Team, comprised of Ciedele Mezger, Randall Starling and Zephyr Milnes placed 1st at Senior Country Week.
- Mixed Volleyball and our boys AFL team won 1st place at District High Country Week.
- Oscar Lin and Matthew Chamberlain, Year 8, received a High Distinction Excellence in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute's Australian National Chemistry Quiz.
- Oscar Lin, Year 8, received a High Distinction in the UNSW ICAS testing for Science.
- Omar Hassan, Year 8, received a High Distinction in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute's Australian National Chemistry Quiz.
- Nicole Chamberlain, Year 6 and Christi Bestry, Year 7, placed in the top 5 in the All Schools Cross Country Championships and then went on to represent WA at the Nationals.
- Lhyncee Cabuguas, Year 12 and Irylle Cabuguas, Year 11, were chosen to attend the International Science School in Sydney.
- Matthew Chamberlain, Year 8, received a High Distinction in the UNSW ICAS testing for Mathematics.
- Omar Hassan, Year 8, received a High Distinction in the Australian Geography Competition.
- Elliot Beat, received an Emerald Award, Angela Addison received a Silver Award, Breanna Mead received a Bronze Award and the Year 10 students were placed 14th out of 233 schools competing in Education Perfect Humanities Championships.
- Charlotte Olsen's piece was chosen for the Year 12 Perspectives Art Works for the Genesis Art Exhibition.
- Phoebe Teakle, Year 6, received 1st prize in the 2019 State Chinese Writing Competition.

- Indi Smith, Year 11, was selected in the Women's Open WA Country Waterpolo team which competed on the Gold Coast. She was the youngest team member at age 16. They played 9 games over the 4 days, and made it through to the bronze medal match.
- Abby Green, Year 9, Indi Smith, Year 11 and Tabitha Rowe, Year 12, competed in the State Equestrian Festival. They were awarded runner-up Champion Secondary Showjumping team and overall Champion Rural School.
- Christi Bestry and Lailah Belottie, Year 7, won the Junior Girls Interschool Surfing competition and qualified to compete in the state finals.
- Primary Champions in Cross Country Greenough Division.
- Primary Handicap Shield for Athletics Greenough Division.
- Primary School Science and Engineering Challenge winner Midwest.

A message from the Roard

At the centre of everything we do is our children: it is a simple statement but it is clear and unambiguous and every decision, action, plan or investment can be judged against this. The reflection of this

last year was the exceptional ATAR results of our year 12s which propelled us into the top regional school in WA for 2018. The cohort excelled, our parents supported them and your school facilitated it. At the centre of this were the actions of the staff which make up such a significant part of this. Well done!

On behalf of the Board, I want to recognise and thank all the staff at our School for the significant work and effort that they so selflessly put in entirely for the good of our students: it counts.

A mountain of work has been done this year. Re-registration - the licence by which we are allowed to operate - occurred in the middle of the year. New standards and expectations were introduced which significantly increased both the work beforehand but also the expectations that are leveled at the leadership of the School. It is a good process and challenges us to make sure we have our policies

and procedures in place but also checks that we truly live by them....by any measure it is a significant audit.

I wish to acknowledge retiring Board members Rob Dines and Zane D'Mello for their positive contributions, clarity of purpose and engaging debate. Your school cannot function without a Board and I welcome three new board members Gabrielle Bracks, Allan Butson and Peter Gerada. The building trade has capacity at the moment and it is important that we provide good facilities to maintain your regional community. Your Board prepared a detailed submission and we have applied for a significant capital grant. It is ambitious and we certainly worked hard in presenting our case to best effect in hoping that we would gain the maximum support we possibly could. The application was received favourably but we still await the final outcome of this.

The reality is though that just as when the School was first started we need to ask for financial support, the more we can do this as a School community the better the result. It is only for our children but it is not just a Board and Principal responsibility, it is a whole community scheme.

As we close for the year and enjoy the Christmas and summer break you have a Board and Principal who are committed to seeing this build take place but we want everyone in our school community to have ownership of this and hope that come next year we can count on your support.

In the end, it is the people that make our School standout and the children that benefit. It is all to do with creating and maintaining the best caring environment for our children. Get it right and the School provides a special place enjoyed by children, they rapidly grow and the intangibles of high self-esteem, resilience in adversity, tolerance and the willingness to try new things gives them the best chance of success and happiness in their own lives.

A dedicated gymnasium is only going to add to this and provide positive benefits.
