#### **Primary School**

2009 marked a new era for the primary school. We increased by two classes and finally were in a position to welcome Mr Alan Evans and Mrs Amanda Cook who share the Assistant Head of Primary role to the primary leadership team.

The highlights of the year were many and varied. The introduction of House Directors for primary saw the House competition step up a few notches and this competition has encouraged friendly rivalry from all Houses. The high standard of the Poetry Performances continue to amaze as does the friendships formed by our House buddy lunch program. This year we introduced a House sporting competition on a Friday afternoon. We look forward to this continuing in 2010.

Our primary choir and percussion ensembles excelled at the Music Festival under the directorship of Mrs Morgan. Our near weekly assemblies showcase the learning that is occurring in the classrooms and we have been delighted with many performances.

Our students were provided with opportunities to attend leadership conferences, the All Saints Literature Festival, sleepovers, year 6 camp, Days of Good Standing, the Wild Man, World of Maths, Vlanga Khoza, Evening of Eminence, discos and other events. These opportunities broaden the educational experience for all.

It has been an action packed year with many things to celebrate on the way. Special thanks to the awesome primary staff, the HOPE team and the parent body for making GGS a great place to be.

#### Middle School

2009 has been an exciting year in middle school and began with an action packed orientation program that provided students and staff with social, academic, creative and physical experiences and challenges.

Electives have again provided a wonderful opportunity for students from year 7 to 9 to work together and select learning that interests them. Students were able to choose from a total of 23 activities which included cooking, horticulture, CO2 dragsters, circus skills, science talent search, CSI Grammar, board games, film to mention just a few. The Junior Round Square Conference was held in Launceston, Tasmanian and was a great experience for the nine participants. Middle School leaders attended a leadership day in term 1 and a number of students capably and proudly represented the school at local and country week sporting events. The Seven Towards Eight Program (STEP) was a new initiative this year where the year 7 boys and girls participated in activities designed to develop gender specific understanding of adolescence.

When reflecting on the progress middle school students have made this year whether it's with their organisation, social tolerance, understanding of increasingly complex concepts or communication the dedication and effort of all who teach and advocate for middle school students must be acknowledged.

#### **Student Development**

This year we sent a small group of year 11 students very early in the year on a demanding Outward Bound journey. This proved to be a challenging experience for the students, but one where they were able to develop stronger bonds and leadership skills in preparation for becoming year 12s in 2010.

For the third year running, the year 12 students along with some other willing helpers in secondary school ran the Batavia Games. This House activity is student led primarily by the senior captains and the year 12s across the whole school. This has been an excellent way for students to demonstrate their leadership qualities and work with other students of all ages.

Every year we have a large number of students completing their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. This year the number of students who are completing their Compass Award and Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award has increased significantly.

With the implementation of the new courses of study and endorsed programs, students who sail on the STS Leeuwin can achieve recognition and points toward their WACE. This year we had our first two students achieve accreditation toward their WACE by sailing on the Leeuwin and completing the required tasks.

#### Curriculum

This year has once again been a busy one in curriculum development as we farewell a TEE system in place since the early 1980s and take part in National Testing for the second year for years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in addition to trialling some curriculum options for our gifted and talented students and some online study skills programs for our secondary students. Our main academic performance markers of the TEE, where the league tables had us listed behind Bunbury Cathedral Grammar as the strongest performing country school and the National Testing program where we consistently performed above both state and national averages, indicate that we are continuing to perform very strongly in the academic sphere. However I believe that it is our commitment to helping all students improve and achieve their goals which sets us apart.

2009 marks the final year of the old TEE subject system in senior schooling as we complete the transition into new courses of study. We have endeavoured to capitalise on student interest for the new courses and have offered the Psychology, Materials, Design and Technology, Outdoor Education, Physical Education Studies and Philosophy and Ethics courses in 2009 in addition to the more traditional Science, English, Mathematics and Arts courses. In 2010 we look forward to offering Health Studies, Applied Information Technology and Business Management Studies and the return of the Media Production and Analysis. Offering such a wide range of courses to a relatively small cohort is a challenge and I am constantly reminded how fortunate we are to have a wonderful blend of experience, enthusiasm and talent in our teaching staff who put into practice the life long learning message.

#### **Board of Governors**

I'm enjoying getting to know the school and the school community. It's a privilege to build on the great foundation laid by those before me. Previous Chaplains and the RE team last year ably led by Miss Wheat compliment the excellent work being done by all the other parts of the school. The Batavia Arch is a great symbol to illustrate how everything holds so well together. Differently shaped pieces supporting each other by mutual pressure give great strength. The communal support that the staff, Board, parents and students give to our school is held together by Christ himself. Ephesians 2:21 says "Christ is the one who holds the building together and makes it grow into a holy temple for the

Lord." May we continue to depend on Christ to hold our school together and all

To that end Christian Education in the Anglican tradition has continued this year for students from kindergarten to year 12, to help them develop in their spiritual life and character. In the primary, Mrs Hamersley has weekly lessons for kindergarten to year 3 and I teach year 3 to year 6. We have explored aspects of the life of Christ that demonstrate his power and authority as God's Son and also God's plan of salvation from the call of Abraham to the settling and deliverance of His people from Egypt through to their settlement of the promised land and how to live God's way. Mrs Hamersley said, "The primary classes that I teach are really involved and the students are even going to the library to find Christian books which is a positive for me."

With year 7 I've used "Big Questions" to explore contemporary issues from a biblical perspective, teaching the major events, concepts and doctrines of the Bible. Miss Wheat has used "Bible Overview" with year 8 and year 9 to show the chronology and big picture of the Bible with clear links to life now. Year 8 have also used "Mistaken Identity" to investigate the life of Jesus while year 9 had an introduction to world religions. I worked through "A spectator's guide to world religions" with year 10 studying the history and teachings of the five major world religions to understand the various religious worldviews on offer and then looked at relationships.

Year 11 and 12 are encouraged to apply their Christian framework and develop a personal Christian ethic that they will take with them well beyond their years at Geraldton Grammar. This is facilitated through our fortnightly Beliefs and Values program that covers areas such as personal decision making, ethics and current topics from a Christian perspective.

Students also actively participate in both formal and informal times of prayer and reflection. These times may occur in the classroom context, or at whole school services and assemblies. Mr Swartzentruber easily engages a Primary Assembly by his tasty devotions. He said, "The chief aim of my devotions is to introduce students to the God who made us and loves us so much that he sent his son Jesus to rescue us. God is the giver of all good things, including the best thing of all: Jesus. Romans 6:23 says that "God's gift is eternal life given by Jesus Christ our Lord."" The whole school church services are a formal element of Religious Education studies and allow students to take part in the traditional part of the Anglican faith. I would like to thank those mentioned for their enthusiasm and support in 2009.

#### Upper school






# Primary HATS
