Principals Report

'I've learned that I still have a lot to learn..'

'I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel.'

This has been a year to celebrate God's abundant goodness at our school and throughout the Anglican Church of North West Australia with its Centenary. A highlight was having Bishop Joseph Abura and his wife Mama Margaret at our end of term 2 Service all the way from Karamoja, Uganda. The primary students welcomed them with a Swahili song 'Faraha' which means 'We wish you joy!' Students actively participated in formal and informal times of prayer and reflection. These times occur in the classroom context, or at whole school services and assemblies. The primary enjoys the thoughtful assembly devotions given by Mr Swartzentruber and Mrs Hamersley. The high school devotions were read by the Chapel Captain, Sarah McLay or student leaders.

Christian Education has continued this year to help students develop in their spiritual life and character. In the primary, Mrs Hamersley has taught weekly lessons for kindergarten to year 3/4s, Mrs Wyles taught the year 4/5s and I taught the year 5/6 and year 6 classes. We have examined the ways Jesus revealed God's purposes, tracing his life and ministry from age 12, showing his fulfillment of Old Testament promises and his power to give new life and wholeness. Then there were lessons looking at Old Testament salvation history from Samuel to Solomon. We also looked at Jesus teaching from the Sermon on the Mount.

I took most of the high school classes with help from Mrs Wyles and Mr Lord with concurrent classes. Year 7 used "Big Questions" to explore contemporary issues from a biblical perspective, teaching the major events, concepts and doctrines of the bible. Year 8 used "mistaken identity?" to investigate the life of Jesus from Mark's gospel while year 9 used "Another dimension" to see Jesus' picture of life from the Sermon on the Mount. Year 10 used "your sneaking suspicions?" to see the relationship between faith and behavior as they began to examine a range of personal and public ethical issues - like life, death, relationships, suffering, forgiveness and meaning.

Year 11 & 12 are encouraged to apply their Christian framework and develop a personal Christian ethic that they will take with them well beyond their years at Geraldton Grammar. This is facilitated through our fortnightly Beliefs and Values program that covers areas such as personal decision making, ethics and current topics from a Christian perspective.

I would like to thank those mentioned as well as students who took part up front or behind the scenes in our services, for their enthusiasm and support in 2010.

That must be very difficult, to learn about something they've never had to think about before.


MR. PUSEY

During 2010 (a composite number with prime factors 2, 3, 5 and 67), the Mathematics Department consisted of Sharon Bradley, Scott Cox, Claire Gasper, Oliver Murray, Jenni Winterbine and Chris Zander. A survey among the students (free of bias), revealed that algebra, as predicted, was the favourite topic closely followed by trigonometry. The student's favourite mathematician was Pythagoras but surprisingly the regular pentagon beat the triangle in the favourite shape category. Worst formula was again taken out by the formula for standard deviation and easiest was the quadratic formula

Highlights during the year were the **significant number** of students who consistently learnt to use the word **multiplication** instead of 'timesing' and the senior students managing to master the concept of **differentiation** in **calculus**.

Students met, mingled with and took advice from many published authors, including the main attraction Craig Silvey (author of "Rhubarb" and "Jasper Jones") along with Hazel Edwards ("There's a Hippopotamus on Our Roof Eating Cake") Barry Jonsberg ("The Whole Business with Kiffo and the Pitbull") and Melaina Faranda ("The Circle" series).

By the time term 2 swung around, we welcomed the energy and vitality of final year teaching student, Jennifer Ley who guided the year 10 and 11s through an eleven week term. The year 10s were furiously studying for their first ever English exam and the year 9s were busy creating their picture book masterpieces - which never cease to impress their English teachers. The year 7s and 8s both completed a film study with the year 7s building some amazing dioramas detailing the film's themes and the year 8s writing their first English essays.

2010 has been a very hectic and exciting year for ICT at Geraldton Grammar School. We have undergone massive infrastructure changes and purchased much cutting edge hardware and software. This increase in technology will provide a platform to allow us to deliver an outstanding education now and in the future in a safe and secure environment.

The summer holidays were a very busy time for the Network Administrator, Mr Tony Duffield and his Assistant, Mr Sean Bennett. They:

- Replaced a number of servers and upgraded others so we could move onto a virtual environment
- Set up projectors in most secondary classrooms
- Installed interactive electronic whiteboards in all primary classroom
- Replaced a number of old computers with Dell workstations
- Upgraded existing software and installed Adobe Web Premium on all school computers
- Increased the wireless network coverage
- Prepared laptops for all full time staff

During term 1 we rolled out 3 laptop trolleys around the school. Each trolley securely stores and charges 28 laptops. During the day it is not uncommon for laptops to be shared amongst a number of classrooms.

Early in term 3 Mr Sean Bennett left the school after 3 years of service and was given a special send off by the primary staff and students. His replacement Mr Mark Wilkinson hit the ground running and has been welcomed by staff and students.

Towards the end of term 3 all staff participated in a full day Cybersafety training program. The many relevant references and concepts presented will complement and enhance our existing Cybersafety programs and help us to better guide the students towards becoming safe and responsible online citizens.





















2010 has seen some musical activity in the community, with the Geraldton Music Festival in term 2 and the Geraldton Iluka Showcase in term 4 at the Queens Park Theatre, where the students have had opportunities to play and sing after many weeks of rehearsing. Closer to home, the Showcase Assembly in the last term of school featured the Chamber Choir, consisting of 13 female voices - tenor, alto and two sopranos groups from year 7 to 11 age groups - have practised hard at tone quality, breathing and technical abilities in choral singing. We had a shakey start to the year, but the girls have grown together to perform with a great attitude, sonority, commitment and loyalty to the group. Having a recent addition of an accompanist (year 8 student) has established the choir even further. The choir rehearses on stage in the Batavia Hall Monday and Thursday lunchtimes. Also performing at this and two other performances over the year is the Combined Schools' Orchestra, a new group to the school this year, which features a number of students from the Strathalbyn Christian College Senior Band (clarinet, drums/violin, alto saxophone), two home school students (violin/alto saxophone, flute), as well as four year 8 students (clarinet, flute, violin, tuned percussion) and one year 9 (guitar) student from GGS. The musicians have worked hard all year to bring their technical ability up to a level they themselves can be proud of, performing pieces by Mussorgsky, James Horner, Henry Mancini, Frankie Sullivan III and Jim Peterik (Rocky III), Mexican folk song and Black's "When the Saints Go Marching In". The orchestra rehearses together Wednesdays after school for an hour and a half. We can never have enough musicians, and I really do recommend anyone who has played an instrument for at least three years should be planning to play in a band in the near future. It is the best way of getting out of your comfort zone and propelling your music skills to a higher level very quickly. So, closet musicians, dust off your saxophone/tuba/cl

The year has gone very quickly, with year 7, 8 and 9 developing their performance skills in keyboard and guitar, voice, bass, drums and Samba ensemble. Writing music is part of the course here and a number of students have performed their own pieces as part of their assessment. Well done to them! Year 10 tackled Stage 1 music, covering Music in the Media - Film, TV and Advertising in the first semester, and Rock Music - pre and post 1980s in the second semester. The boys are especially keen to show their abilities in the metal and rock areas with songs by Bullet For My Valentine. We acquired four new laptops in the second term, which has aided in the arranging and composition side of the music course. Other instruments acquired this year have been ten digital Yamaha keyboards, Ashton electric drum kit and double kick for the acoustic set plus drum stool, Greg Bennett metal style electric guitar, SX Signature electric guitar, Peavey 60W bass amplifier, Canon Legria video camera FS306 and tripod, six new headphones, and two new AKG mics.






In the middle school teachers invite very able students to participate in special extension classes in Science and English. In these classes students spend some time each week with a small group of like-minded peers developing their interests.

In the extension English class we have had fun exploring literary terms and analytical skills during semester 1. We read a variety of texts and picked them apart searching for meanings and literary techniques used to position the audience and worked on writing analytical essays deconstructing our studied texts. 























Choir
