In 2023, we had our first full year in our new gymnasium and saw the landscaping with new plants, grass and trees go in around it.

It looks beautiful, and I never tire of the wow factor when walking near the gym.

The School year started with approximately 570 students and finished with 626 students. Geraldton is growing, as is our school.



I took six students on a Round Square trip to Ottawa, Canada, at Ashbury College in February. The joy of seeing the students meet other students from around the world, hearing about the issues that Canada is facing and enjoying snow was all worth it for the short time we went.

This year, we enjoyed a school musical, Seussical The Musical. I thank Katie Clarkson, our Secondary Drama Teacher, who, in her own words, stated the following:

"This has been an exciting yet sometimes terrifying undertaking! Seussical marks the first musical I have directed as a Drama Teacher. I couldn't have asked for a more committed, enthusiastic or inspiring cast of students to embark on this journey with. I hope you experience some of the magic."

Well, Ms Clarkson, we certainly did experience the magic and thank you for providing this fantastic opportunity to our students who live for the Arts.





Artificial intelligence has come on the scene this year in education, and all educators are grappling with its arrival and how best to harness its strengths while ensuring students can still think critically. If you love reading science fiction, you know that it is the genre that has always captured the imagination through the exploration of new worlds and technologies that seemed impossible at the time they were written. However, many of these imaginative ideas have become reality, making science fiction a precursor to science fact.

One of the most famous science fiction writers of all time, Isaac Asimov, wrote a short story in 1956 titled The Last Question that pondered the future of humanity and artificial intelligence. Asimov imagined a future where humankind created a supercomputer to answer any question, including how to reverse entropy.

Today, we are closer than ever to Asimov's vision, and it is Artificial intelligence (AI) that has captured the attention of the world with the explosion of extensive language model tools such as ChatGPT, Google's version Bard, and soon-to-be-released Microsoft's co-pilot to name but a few. ChatGPT has taken the world by storm since its launch in November. It can write plagiarism-free essays, write computer codes, assist programmers with debugging incorrect code, act as a research assistant by succinctly summarising large bodies of texts, solve complex mathematical problems, compose music and explain complicated concepts in age-appropriate ways. It can sit the Bar exam, and every new update gets a higher grade. The speed of AI advancement is astonishing but not surprising given Kurzweil's law of accelerating returns, which argues that the rate of technological change is exponential.

As a school, we cannot ignore the progress of technology and the implications this has for our young people.

























#### INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC PROGRAM


















































#### **ARTS CAPTAIN REPORT**
















### K-2 Investigations
