AND SHE HAD A QUIET WAY OF BRINGING OTHERS ALONG FOR THE JOURNEY. IN THE COMMUNITY SHE WAS WELL KNOWN FOR HER BEAUTIFUL PAINTINGS AND WAS AN EXTREMELY TALENTED ARTIST WITH A UNIQUE STYLE OF WORKING WITH FABRIC. 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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL



Given that the Archway captures our history, I cannot go by without writing about COVID-19 and what feels like the longest year ever. The year started with some of the worst bushfires over East in the history of Australia and then relentlessly jumped straight into controlling the spread of COVID-19. Suddenly the feeling of being carefree and invincible was taken away.

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses that cause respiratory infections. These can range from the common cold to more serious diseases. COVID-19 is a disease caused by a new form of Coronavirus which was first reported in December 2019 in Wuhan City, China. Its impact on Western Australia began in late March, our Premier Mark McGowan closed our borders in early April, leaving Geraldton cut off from Perth. The Regional borders remained closed until early June which had a huge impact on our community, as many of us have family in Perth. We were also unable to travel interstate, a situation no-one could ever have foreseen. Flights in and out of Geraldton were drastically reduced and as a community, we all had to support each other through those challenging two months. The kindness of parents and staff during that time is something I will never forget. The changes to restrictions were constant and as a school, we worked hard to manage these changes. Never have I written so many letters only to have a new set of conditions and restrictions arrive in my inbox shortly after a letter was sent out.

As a school, we had the foresight to see what was coming and we reacted quickly to get the staff prepared for online learning through Google Meet & Classroom as the fear of the spread gripped Geraldton at the end of March.





At the end of Term 1 the School shut down for 9 days commencing on Tuesday 31 March and staff had the challenge of teaching online. Each teacher taught from their respective classrooms and at the end of the 9 days just before Term 1 break, they were feeling the impact of looking at a screen all day in isolation, as well as sore backs and necks. We had some students who remained on campus to help our parents who had to continue work and had no other means of having their children looked after. This in itself made for interesting times as teachers were rostered on to aid students who were from various year groups. Never have I been prouder of a community. Never was there a better example of why Geraldton Grammar School is the premier school in the Midwest.

What are the keywords we have heard over and over again and are tired of this year? COVID-19, Regional and State border restrictions, hand sanitiser, social distancing, hand washing, unprecedented, lockdown, 1.5 metres, toilet paper, job keeper, the new normal, Zoom, online learning, webinars, and Google Meets. We can't forget, no matter what year it is, but this year in particular, Donald Trump who failed in his bid to be re-elected as President of the USA.

For students, there were lost opportunities in terms of leadership, assemblies, excursions, the Canberra trip for Year 6s, Senior Country Week and much more however we were luckier than most schools and still managed to have our Senior Formal, and reinstated some of the earlier events later into the year. We were still able to have a proper Valedictory service but were unable to have the whole school at the final graduation assembly. Our Year 12s were faced with adjustments to curriculum and an uncertainty of final exams. Universities started to offer places based on Year 11 results and students found it difficult to remain motivated.

Despite all the challenges of 2020 and a year that will be forever cemented in our minds, there were some great achievements this year listed below:

- The Dux of School was named the John Royce Dux of School Prize.
- D'Arcy Slater Tennis Cup Attracting more than 80 young players from across the State, the longstanding regional tournaments will see players from 7 different zones, including the Midwest, Upper Great Southern, Lower Great Southern, Great Southern, South West, Central Districts, Pilbara and Eastern Districts, hit the Busselton Tennis Club to contest the U/14 junior singles competition over 4 days. Caleb Sewell competed in the D'Arcy Slater Tennis cup and won the tournament.
- National History Challenge 2020: National History WA State Winner & National Winner Women's History Category: Congratulations to Millie Patterson.
- The Instrumental Music Program has continued to grow with approximately 95 students enroled in instrumental studies at Geraldton Grammar School. Our students seamlessly worked through online lessons during COVID-19 and then moved back to the classroom for face to face lessons and rehearsals.
- Education Perfect Humanities Championships 2020 256th overall globally out of 1664 schools.
- Interschool Surfing 9 students participated in the Interschool Surfing competition at Back Beach. Amber Bestry and Christi Bestry won the Junior Girls Bodyboarding. Overall, the surfing team finished 3rd.
- Our mixed hockey team were the champions at District Country Week where Rosie Perham sang the National Anthem at both the opening and closing ceremonies.
- 2020 University of New South Wales ICAS Assessments: Mathematics High Distinction: Matthew Chamberlain.
- Midwest Primary Interschool Swimming Champions.
- Eagles Cup winners in AFL.
- Randolph Stow Upper Primary Poetry 1st Wil Burgess Why I Love Relief Teachers.


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

The COVID-19 pandemic in Australia has been part of the ongoing worldwide pandemic of the coronavirus disease from 2019. It is important as a school to capture this in our history.

The first confirmed case in Australia was identified on 25 January 2020 in Victoria when a man who had returned from Wuhan, China tested positive.

Australian borders were closed to all non-residents on 20 March 2020. Social distancing rules were imposed on 21 March 2020 and state governments started to close nonessential services such as restaurants, gyms and sporting clubs. The number of new cases initially grew sharply, then levelled out at about 350 per day around 22 March 2020 and started falling at the beginning of April to under 20 cases per day by the end of the month.

As of 8 December 2020, 27 972 cases and 908 deaths have been reported in Australia.


I know it has been a tough year for all of us, limiting us on activities and events, however I am very proud that those in the arts have stayed motivated and hardworking.





The horizon is calling my name anxiously Pulling me up to the surface I'm lasting on oxygen rations when I'm about to hit the surface I black out and lay unconscious


I'm'suddenly elevated by a smooth but slimy surface However, I take no notice The exterior of the surface is giant and metallic When I emerge from the limpid sea



My essay is about the stigmatisation of nurses suffering from shell shock or PTSD as we know it during WWI. I chose it when I was initially just researching nurses in WWI for an essay, when I saw a quote from a nurse saying that they spent time with soldiers in their free time. I had this moment of 'Wait, but didn't nurses get shell shocked too?', and thus the research began. It was difficult to find good information on the topic and it was pretty stunning to see how little nurses and women have been considered in the history of shell shock, instead focusing on men and soldiers. It was shocking to learn of the focus on men's mental health, tossing any symptoms of nurse's mental health aside. This was despite the awful environment and traumatic things they saw on an almost daily basis. Nurses were told that it was their fault that they had trauma symptoms as they went to the war out of choice, and their severe symptoms were blamed on their 'natural tendency towards hysteria'. Seeing how deep the attitude of sexism ran was eye-opening to the attitudes of the era, and what parts of that attitude remain today.


