Author Visit - Martin Chatterton

Students from Pre Primary to Year 6 thoroughly enjoyed a visit from Martin Chatterton. What an engaging and comedic speaker! Martin Ed Chatterton has been writing, illustrating and performing successfully around the world for the last thirty years appearing extensively at schools, festivals, conferences and on TV and radio in the UK, Australia, India, China and the USA. His books for children and adults have been published in more than a dozen languages, and have won or been shortlisted in multiple awards in the UK, US and Australia including being shortlisted for the 2018 Lollies Award in the UK (formerly the Roald Dahl Prize) and for an ARIA (with Pat Davern) in 2016. He has illustrated books by some of the leading names in children's literature and has an ongoing co-writing relationship with global publishing phenomenon, James Patterson. As 'Ed Chatterton', he writes adult crime fiction, screenplays for TV and film and in 2017 completed his PhD on slavery. Martin's picture book, Winter Of The White Bear, which emerged from his doctorate (published October 2019), was shortlisted for the 2020 Prime Minister's Literary Awards and the Patricia Wrightson Prize in the 2021 NSW Premier's Literary Awards.



WASO Excursion

On Thursday of Week 2, our Year 5 and 6 students attended an excursion at Queens Park Theatre to watch the Western Australian Symphony Orchestra (WASO) perform a final rehearsal for their Regional Tour Concert. Students participated in observing the orchestra and conductor work together to put the finishing touches on their performance.

The performance presented students an opportunity to gain insight into a concert program and engage in a musician's experience preparing to perform. Early Steps Science

There were over 1250 competitors ranging from 10 year-olds to Olympians at the 82nd Australian Cross Country Championships, the first one held since 2019. They all competed on a brutal 2000m course at Oakbank, South Australia. It was freezing cold, heavy with mud and long hills that offered no reprieve, but Christi knew she had the belief and fitness to handle it. Lining up for the Girls 15yrs 4000m, with 145 of the best cross country runners in Australia, Christi showed grit and determination to finish 29th crossing the line with nothing left in the tank. It was a fantastic experience that even included meeting some Olympians (who said that Oakbank was the hardest 10km course that they have ever run!).

School Sport Australia also held a teams relay event, with Christi competing in the Girls 14/15 yrs 5 x 2000m (thankfully on a different course!). WA narrowly missed out on a medal coming 4th.

Christi enjoyed the whole championships so much she is now aiming to make the state team for the next meet being held at Stromlo Forest Park, Canberra, in August 2023.

The next exciting event to watch is the 2022 World Athletics Cross Country Championships, being hosted by Athletics Australia at Bathurst, NSW, in February 2023.
