




































Geraldton Grammar School had 45 students represent our school at the ACC Swimming Carnival in Perth on Friday 21 March.

Ride 2 School Day

'Your Move' Program- new to GGS!

Ride to School Day was a successful event held in Week 7 and helped us launch this new program, with 69 students choosing active travel options.

It was an opportunity for students, parents and teachers to try riding, walking, skating or scootering to school, as well as celebrating all the regular walkers and riders. On these days, we aim to normalise walking and riding to school, and hopefully help our families create a new habit. The day is a chance to celebrate walking and riding on a large scale and to prove it can be done.

We are now a Your Move School!

<u>Your Move</u> is a Department of Transport program that encourages students and their families to get active by walking, riding and scootering to school or catching public transport, more often.

Making a small behavioural change a few times a week can result in huge benefits for your child and the community, including:

- reduced congestion, travel times and parking problems around schools;
- improved safety for everyone at drop-off and pick-up times;
- reduced carbon dioxide emissions around the school;
- lifelong improved health and emotional well-being due to instilling positive exercise habits at a young age;
- improved concentration and academic performance; and
- more sustainable and cost-effective transport outcomes, such as reducing the need for investment in
 parking that may only be utilised for a short period each day, and reduced road infrastructure maintenance
 costs.

We earn Your Move points by posting stories and photos of our active transport adventures on the website; these can translate into grants to fund active transport facilities and activities for the school and other rewards. A group of our Year 6 students will be leading this program along with Mrs Buckly, Ms Martin and Mrs Angelatos.









Stargirls STEM Camp & ICRAR Workshops



In Week 4 of this term a number of our secondary students were selected to attend the Stargirls STEM Camp. This was a 2-day immersive run by the International Centre for Radio Astronomy Research (ICRAR) at Curtin University, hosted by the Geraldton Universities Centre. The aim of the camp is to inspire female students into STEM-related subjects and careers, especially space and astronomy sciences. The students were able to meet and hear from inspiring mentors and participate in hands-on activities such as controlling research scale telescopes.

At the Midwest Stargirls STEM Camp, we had the opportunity to meet and talk with engineers, astronomers, radio astronomers, and many other amazing professionals who work with organizations like SKAO, ICRAR, and CSIRO. We learned how to set up and use telescopes, and we were even given accounts to capture images using the SPIRIT Telescopes, located further south nearby Perth. It was an incredible experience, and I would absolutely love to attend again if given the chance. – Peyton Teale, Year 8.

Following on from the Stargirls STEM Camp, Geraldton Grammar School was offered the chance for the Radio Astronomers from that camp to visit the school and run some workshops. They worked with students from Year 3 through to Year 12 answering some of the big questions regarding our Solar Systems, Galaxy and the Universe. It was so great to not only hear about the amazing Science but to hear the thought-provoking questions provided by students at every level and to have the presenters also share a little about their journey into Radioastronomy and Science Communication as well as some great Science Fiction recommendations!

Solar Model Car Challenge

Arts and Technologies

Design and Technology

This term, our Design & Technology students have taken on an inspiring sustainability challenge, addressing a critical need in our environment. Decades of land clearing have left many native bird species—ranging from tiny parrots and boobook owls to the endangered Carnaby's Cockatoos—struggling to find suitable nesting hollows.

In partnership with BirdLife Midwest, the students have been crafting custom-designed nesting boxes in various sizes to support these incredible birds. Using recycled materials, they've built sturdy, eco-friendly boxes equipped with internal ladders and durable hardwood entrances. Each box is carefully finished to blend seamlessly into the natural surroundings, ensuring they are not only functional but also long-lasting.

Throughout the project, the students have dived in with enthusiasm, mastering valuable skills such as reading working drawings, precise measuring and marking, safe use of power tools, and assembly techniques.

School Production


Term One Has Soared Into Action with a Touch of Magic in Drama!

Zones of Regulation

For the last three weeks, students in Years 7 and 8 PDP classes have participated in a crash course in the Zones of Regulation. This program is aimed at allowing students to identify how they are feeling and to acknowledge when the feelings they are experiencing may not be good for their wellbeing.

They have looked at the four zones and the feelings associated with each zone: blue, green, yellow and red. While ALL feelings are valid, they understand that it is not good for us to be in a particular zone for too long a period of time.



They identified and categorised a myriad of different feelings and considered scenarios and triggers which may involve these feelings.

Each student now has a personal toolkit that they can look to when their feelings are out-of-sorts which can help them feel well more of the time. Some of these include opening up lines of communication with a peer or someone who can support or listen to their thoughts, taking a walk, eating healthy food, taking a drink, etc.

Students are now more confident to open up about their feelings and support each other in ways which help their overall well-being.









